

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Rosh HaShana 5780 will start Sunday night, September 29.

There will be a new voice on the Bimah this year. **Yaakov Brummer** is coming from overseas, thanks to the generosity of a few members who have accepted to contribute to his salary and thanks to the **Maicas** family who has accepted to lodge him.

I believe that you will enjoy the services and hope you will be many to join the community.

Yaakov is **Shlomo's** brother (Hazzan in Bangor). Both have accepted to perform during a concert of Jewish songs, concert that will be open to the public. Please make as much publicity as you can for that concert. It will be a fund raising event for the

Now, some news from the past few months ... First please allow me to emphasize that Moncton has a totally kosher bakery. I encourage all of you to use the products of **Brothers Bakery** as much as you can. Thank you to **John and Darlene** for the enormous sacrifices you have made in koshering the bakery.

The community, unfortunately, had to deal with three losses. **Joe Rinzler** and **Abe Rubin** will be thoroughly missed and we all feel deeply for the tragedy that befell the **EI** family. Twenty-two-year-old **Noam** was the victim of a terrible accident. Thanks to the generosity of the community (with some outside donors), an amount of close to 20 000\$ was raised to help bury Noam in **kibbutz Sa'Ad**; a kibbutz in the Negev between Ashkelon and Beer Sheva, not too far from the Gaza strip. Noam had his Brit Milah and Bar Mitzvah there. He spent lots of his childhood in Sa'Ad.

The EI family, in return, has made four beautiful gifts to the

Synagogue, bearing Noam's name: a white Torah cover and a white Bimah cover, both for the High Holidays, also a red Bimah cover and a beautiful Tikun. Pictures of the first three objects can be found on these two pages.

"Apples & Honey"

"Dip the apple in the honey"... I can't help thinking of this song whenever anyone mentions apples close to Rosh HaShana. More than a kindergar-teners lullaby, this song is meant to teach kids at an early age the brachos and the L'Shana Tovah blessing, the concepts of dipping, the symbolism of apples and honey, and why these are strong stirring

metaphors for inspiring the appropriate mindset and emotions for this time of year. Dipping an apple in honey is composed of two parts: the apple, which is round and smooth to symbolize that the year should be free of bumps from turmoil and hardship. (It is similar to one of the reasons for a round wedding band at a Jewish wedding). And the honey is to symbolize sweetness and a flow of bounty, because we hope the year in front of us will be sweet and abundant. Together it is a symbol of sweet bounty and with the bracha we say over it, we are praying that Hashem should give us this kind of year ahead.

The process of dipping the apple in honey can also represent another message: there are times when life gets very hard, challenges arise, tragedies can hit, and the struggle to keep going is very real and sometimes seems like it's just not possible ... The challenge is to take those difficult times and turn them on their head: when things aren't sweet enough, make them extra sweet - go all out, because sometimes the only way to bounce back and thrive is to douse your fruitful opportunities with extra sweetness and joy ... and only then can the inner light burst through and bloom beautifully so that you as a person will shine, and your life will flow with a bounty of happiness and meaning.

And of course the flowers he would send to Sharon every Shabbat.

Then there were the holidays.....

Sheldon loved the holidays because he knew that it was a time to be with family and friends; as well as, because it was the right

thing to do, any other person who needed a holiday meal.

As much as we all loved it we also knew what we were in for....

First the creation of the menu and the recipes which he would research via cook books and the Food Network for months...leading him to be the armchair chef and Sharon inevitably saying "you're driving me crazy.....I've had enough leave me alone already".

Then the shopping; whether it be for chicken schmaltz for the potato kugel or of course the ever important Passover chocolate order nothing was overlooked, although to no avail Sharon did try to keep him in check. She did draw the line when he insisted she serve Goose.

There are many reasons for celebrating holidays but none greater than the memories they create....even when the seder is being led by a loving tyrant with a singing voice only a family could love.

With all of the teasing, practical jokes, and even at times heated discussions there was one thing that was never questioned..... his home was always open and he would do anything for his family. There was truly no greater love in his life than his family and his very special Shayndle Bear.

It is quite ironic that we stand here to unveil a monument for a man that never wanted accolades nor prizes of which he was awarded countless amounts, such as receiving the Order of New Brunswick and the naming of the Dr. Sheldon H Rubin Oncology Center. There is no person more deserving to have his memory

etched permanently into the collective memory of the Jewish community than Shmuel ben Yitzrak - Sheldon Hershel Rubin.

The custom of placing a monument over the grave of a departed person is a very ancient Jewish tradition. The first recorded erection of a headstone is in the Book of Genesis where Jacob erected a tombstone over the grave of his wife Rachel.

It is explained that Jacob foresaw that the future exiles of the Jewish people from Israel would have to pass her tomb; therefore, he buried her there, so that she could pray for God's mercy on her nation. The purpose of the tomb is not to memorialize Rachel, but rather to designate the place of her burial, so that future exiles could cling to that tomb and she could pray for them. Uncle Sheldon was a great man and there is no monument that would be large enough to memorialize him, however let all people who pass this stone know that here lies a great man praying for them.
